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Introduction


Ebenezer's are stacked rocks representing what the Lord has done to help you. The word translates as "stone of help" and is a tangible reminder of all the Lord has done. Too often, we forget how God sustained or delivered us from times of trials, so having a place to record and remember those times is crucial to our ever-wandering hearts.

In 1 Samuel 4, the prophet Samuel erects an Ebenezer after the deliverance of God's people from their vicious enemies, the Philistines. The Israelites were to remember that there is nothing to fear when they place their trust in God alone.

Chapter Context

Samuel grew up under the supervision of the prophet Eli. Eli trained and mentored Samuel, and it was Samuel who God chose to establish as the next prophet for Israel. Before Samuel takes leadership, God punishes Israel for their wickedness and idolatry and gives them over to their enemies, the Philistines. For twenty years, the people lamented after the Lord. They were in ruins because they did not keep their hearts sealed to God.

At this time, God uses Samuel to lead the people back to Him and enjoy the benefits of belonging entirely to the King of kings.

- 6. What does Samuel do for the people of Israel (v. 9)? How does God answer (10-11)?
- 7. Why does Samuel raise an Ebenezer?


- 1. Describe Israel's behavior in this section? What do you learn from them? How do you relate to them?

- 7. How might taking times to remember help prepare you for the future?


Ebenezer Application

Life moves quicker than we realize. If we rush into a new season without first reflecting on where we have come from, we do a disservice to ourselves and God because we aren't designating time to grieve, rejoice, and learn from the experiences we have encountered and that God has walked us through. In 1 Samuel 4, the Israelite people are turning from their sins and towards God. Through the process, they experience His forgiveness and saving power. Samuel raises an Ebenezer to remind all of how God is the one in control.

This week, carve out time to reflect on your past season of life and ask God to reveal himself to you through those experiences. Then raise an Ebenezer by printing out a handout or finding actual stones to stack and write a word on each stone that represents God's role in your last season. Refer to this Ebenezer throughout your next season (new year, semester, month, etc.). You can add to it or make a new one every so often. The point is to take the time and remember.
